## Grown-Ups at Our School: Be Kind Rules

Our school is a happy place because lots of people work together – parents, carers, teachers, and children. When grown-ups and school staff are kind and work as a team, it helps us learn, feel safe, and grow up ready for the world.

This is a reminder about how grown-ups should behave in and around our school so everyone feels **respected, inspired, supported**, safe and calm, and can **exceed** by trying their best as part of our **RISE** values.

### What Grown-Ups Should Do

We want all parents, carers, and visitors to:

- Be kind and respectful to everyone.
- Remember our school is a Christian school and respect what we believe.
- Use polite words and calm behaviour.
- Work together with teachers to help children do their best.
- Be good role models so children can learn how to behave well.
- Talk to the school calmly if there is a problem and try to solve it peacefully.
- Help their own children behave properly, especially in public.
- Go to the school office (or send an email) if they have a message, instead of shouting into classrooms.
- Be patient and understand that teachers are very busy and may not always be able to help straight away.
- **Follow school rules about allergies and snacks:** only send in food that is safe for your child and others, and avoid bringing nuts or other known allergens.
- **Keep children safe on the roads:** supervise your children near the school gates, use crossings safely, and park considerately to protect everyone.

### What Grown-Ups Must NOT Do

To keep everyone safe and happy, grown-ups must not:

- Shout at, threaten, or be rude to other parents, children, or staff.
- Use bad language or say unkind things about people.
- Make jokes or comments that could hurt or upset others.
- Disrupt lessons, offices, or school activities.
- Shout into classrooms at the start or end of the day.
- Treat anyone badly because of who they are, how they look, what they believe, or anything else that makes them special and unique.
- Argue with or tell someone else's child off.
- Hit, scare or shout at children – including their own – on school grounds.
- Smoke, drink alcohol, or take drugs at school or come to school under their influence.
- Bring dogs onto school grounds or near the school gates.
- Damage school property.
- Bring unsafe food or snacks that may cause allergic reactions in other children.
- Behave in a way that endangers children near the roads or parking areas.

## About Social Media and Group Chats

Social media and group chats should not be used to be unkind or mean about:

- The school
- Teachers or staff
- Children or families

If grown-ups are worried about something, they should talk to the school properly, not post about it online. Writing nasty or untrue things online can really hurt people and may lead to serious consequences.

Cyberbullying (being mean online) is treated just as seriously as bullying at school.

## What Happens If Rules Are Broken?

If a grown-up breaks these rules:

- They may be asked to leave the school straight away.
- They might not be allowed to come to school events.
- In serious cases, they may be banned from school or the police may be called.
