Holocaust Memorial Assembly

All the children gathered in the school hall for a very special memorial assembly to mark the 80th anniversary of the Holocaust. We heard about people in the past who were treated badly because of their religion or colour of their skin. The children heard about Jewish people and listened to real life stories about what it was like to be a young Jew in Germany.

Throughout the assembly, children heard about discrimination and how some people, even today, treat people badly because of their race, religion or because they are different. The children heard a poem about racism which was written by Rose Young when she was eight years old for a Holocaust Memorial Day poetry competition.

In Nursery, the children have been learning about what type of clothes we wear in hot and cold weather. They worked really well in pairs to sort the items. Well done!

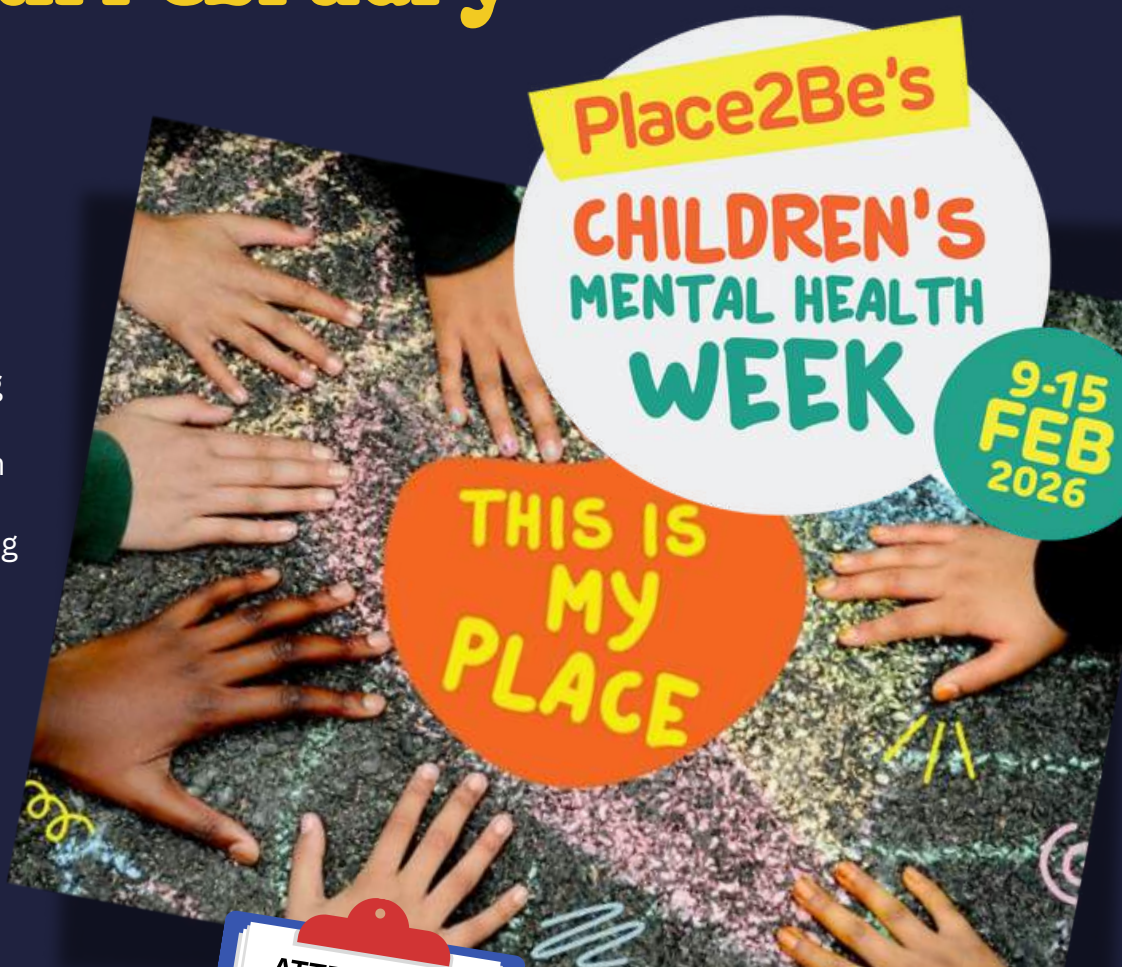


Children's Mental Health Week

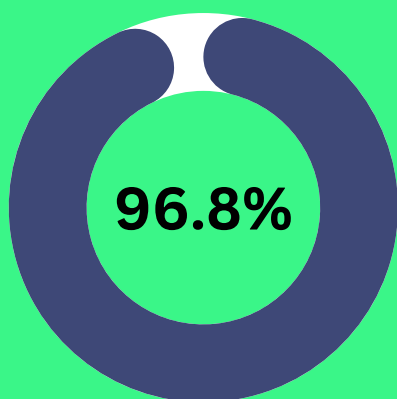
9th to 15th February

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

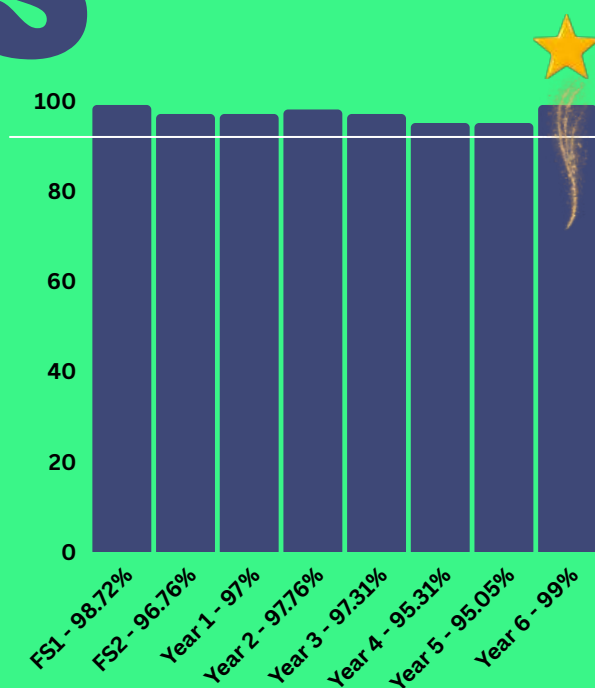


Our whole school attendance for the week 96.86%

Year 2

Exploring the Five Pillars and Common Values

Year 2 have been exploring the Five Pillars of Islam and thinking about how these important values appear across many different religions.
