Exploring how materials can change shape!

This week in science, we explored how materials can change shape!

Using plasticine, we experimented with squashing, twisting, stretching, and bending to see how its form could be altered. The children loved getting hands-on and discovering the effects of different forces.

Afterwards, they applied their new knowledge to an investigation around the classroom—testing which everyday materials could be stretched, bent, or twisted. From rubber bands to paperclips, there were some surprising results!

The children worked scientifically, making predictions and recording their observations carefully.

A fantastic, practical lesson full of curiosity, creativity, and scientific thinking!





Well done to the children who took part in the orienteering event at EIS on Saturday.


The event included a sprint finish in the athletics stadium. Special shout-out to the younger children taking part (and the parents chasing behind!).

The next event will be at Bolehills park on Saturday 22nd November.





All classes that achieved 97% and above will get an extra 10 minute break.





We're so excited to share some wonderful news from our classroom – the children have been busy writing, and their work has been absolutely brilliant!



Some highlights include:


- Children using ambitious language and punctuation like pros and taking real pride in their work.

This week we

have been representing the fossilisation

process. We used different materials to represent the animal and what happens as it decays in the sea. We used candy floss to show how the soft material decays in the water and leaves behind the skeleton/ hard parts (dog biscuit).

Over time, the sediment layers build up and harden until it eventually becomes a rock and a fossil! We used layers of paper towel to represent this.

Year 3 showed great enthusiasm and curiosity when learning about this topic.
